# **International Skiing**

Returning to Wengen after their strong showing last year, the boys once again dominated the U21s, with Barnaby Schilder (Upper Sixth, Temple) taking a Gold, Bronze and a Cup in the final rankings. Special congratulations also go to Brooks Stevens (Fifth Form, Walpole), who very narrowly missed out on a Bronze in his division against some world-class competition.

Overall, they were incredibly successful and enjoyable trips. Both the boys and girls learned a great deal during their time away, and the teams returned to Stowe exhilarated and excited for the skiing to come. We look forward to next year and the competitions it holds.

## Holocaust Memorial Evening

Stowe's annual Holocaust Memorial evening took place on Tuesday 30 January. The event featured a number of moving and thought-provoking contributions from the Drama, Modern Foreign Languages (MFL) and Music Departments, which focused on the 2024 theme: Fragility of Freedom.

Emily Gauvain (Fourth Form, Queen's) began the evening with a recital of Pavel Friedman's poem 'The Butterfly'. Julia Likierman (Fourth Form, Stanhope), along with other Fourth Form drama pupils shared a thought-provoking poem, 'Ballad of the Doomed Jews of Europe' written by her Uncle Arthur Szyk, a Polish Jew who was living in the USA during the war.

We also enjoyed a group performance from Drama of Paul King's 'Arbeit Macht Frei' and a very moving monologue from Orlando Mayhew (Fourth Form, Chatham). The monologue 'Stop Crying' was written by Ian Embelton and compiled from the personal accounts of Holocaust survivors. The contributions from Drama concluded with a recitation from Annabel Lloyd (Fifth Form, Stanhope) of Alexander Kimel's poem 'I Cannot Forget'.

The Music Department also provided

some emotionally resonating pieces, which added to the reflective mood of the evening. Jemima Pearson-Gee (Upper Sixth, Nugent) sang Hannah Szenes' 'Eli Eli' and we were delighted to welcome back Old Stoic Audrey Au (Lyttelton 21), who gave a very affecting performance of Samuel Cohen's 'Hatikvah' (The Hope).




The evening closed with a performance by Stowe's Hebrew Choir, who sang 'Avinu Malkeinu'.



# Melber

Ken Melber, Stowe Head of Art 1987-1992, and Bruce Houseparent 1992-2000, sadly passed away on Friday 9 February 2024 after a relatively short battle with Alzheimer's.

When freed from the terraces at Middlesborough, Ken taught at Gateshead Tech, then at Okeni Teachers' Training College in Nigeria. After a spell back in the North-East, he went to Malawi, to help set up the brand new school of Kamuzo Academy, where he was Head of Art and a Housemaster. He spent a brief period at Framlingham, before he came to Stowe, becoming Head of Art and then Houseparent of Bruce House.

As Head of the Art Department, Ken's success and example were equally amazing, always working in harmony with Guy Scott (Father of current Head of Art Daniel Scott); his enthusiasm carried that mighty department along to levels of national fame, bringing Stowe enormous credit.

Bruce House was run by Ken in a very special way. Adjectives like unorthodox or even unique were used not inappropriately. It was seatof-the-pants stuff sometimes, to be sure, but, behind the façade of the Northern wide boy, there was in fact shrewd and meticulous planning. Bruce House excelled in sport under Ken, even if it also distinguished itself by regularly coming last in the House singing competition. And what about those home-spun House plays, all blondes and lavatories? The boys respected Ken the way they respect all gifted Schoolmasters. They were grateful for his genial tolerance. At the same time, structures were set up and lines were drawn. They were generous ones but they could never be crossed. The boys were given reasons for their existence and this, of course, encouraged respect and obedience. More importantly, their loyalty came from their appreciation of Ken's instinctive kindness, his spontaneous awareness of another persons unease or need; also earning him the friendship of a number of grateful colleagues. Ken was technically an excellent artist, with a breadth of range, being a sculptor as well as a painter.

It was to his credit that he had the self-discipline to continue painting, even after he became a Houseparent. Alongside his strong sense of draughtmanship in drawing, he was inventive and experimental in painting, bringing this combination of discipline and imagination together in the final realisation of his work. The fact that he was a real practitioner, of course, made him such an inspirational teacher.

This connected with Ken's understanding of the pictures of the great artists: his ability to see their unique and extraordinary strengths and to explain this to others. In the Art and History of Art Department excursions to Venice, Florence and Paris, organised by Ken with

Crispin Robinson, many of Ken's strengths were brought together. He communicated his enthusiasm for his subject, not only in his obvious joy in seeing the works of the Great Masters, but also in finding a quiet couple of hours to go sketching by himself, thus, in both ways, setting an example to his pupils. These trips were among the highlights of some Stoics careers at School. They were meticulously structured and the pupils worked extremely hard. They will be remembered for their breath-taking cultural richness and also for their sense of fun and freedom. This was the magic of the Ken Melber balance. To achieve this, one must be an accomplished administrator, a fine teacher and a good companion; Ken was all of these.

Rugby was important in Ken's life. He played internationally for Malawi and, here, was much involved in the Buckingham Rugby Club. He helped with a number of different School teams at various levels, getting the most out of the boys with a mixture of enthusiasm, encouragement and sheer terror! As a referee, he never stopped talking and, when 'supporting' his own team on the touch-line, remarks would be heard such as "This team has more soft centres than a box of chocolates."

Behind all this is the figure of 'Our lass'. Ken and Annie supported and complemented each other wonderfully. And what Annie sometimes had to put up with! In Florence on one occasion, Ken thought that it would be a nice present to take her back a box of chocolates, each one wrapped in a picture of a different naked lady. When he gave a party for the Upper Sixth in 1999, all the boys (and the Houseparents) were instructed to turn up wearing the most vile ties and shirts that they could find. The only person not let into the secret was the hostess Annie, whose astonishment, after slaving away in preparation all day, might be imagined. Annie helped to keep Ken's feet on the ground and her disapproval struck more anguish into his being than an entire opposing Rugby Fifteen could ever begin to do.

Ken Melber's strength of administration, temperament, judgment, compassion and humour came together on the day of the Bruce House fire. These qualities assisted him after he left Stowe for his new post as Second Master and Head of Art at Wycliffe College in Gloucestershire and Head of a Junior School in the USA.

We send Annie, Kate and Steve (their daughter and son) our love, best wishes and condolences at the loss of such a wonderful and inspirational teacher, role model, father and husband.

From James' save the ball was picked up by Stowe and the team countered at pace, and a delightful through ball found its way to Josh Reynolds who finished the move with a brilliant first-time finish. 

# Digital Learning

### Do parents have the right skills?

As adults and even children, we are not taught ways of learning digital. Liz Williams CEO from Future Dot Now (a coalition of industry leaders focused on closing the digital skills gap for working age adults) highlighted this point recently when she was invited to Westminster to discuss the digital skills gap. "Culturally, it needs to change," she said. "We just assume that if we give somebody something, that's easy to use, that they'll be able to work it out. This needs to change, we need to train them in it."

So, none of us are taught digital, yet, as adults, we are thrust into the digital world, whether that be in our social lives or at work. Some of us adopt the transitions in technology and digital with enthusiasm but many do not.

### Why do some adults struggle?

When it comes to technology, its misuse might come down to:

- Fear: Many have fear: fear of change, fear of misunderstanding, fear they are behind others.
- Lack of motivation: Many do not feel motivated to use technology and might ask why they need to understand it.
- Mistrust: Many adults do not even trust technology.

If children grow up with 'easy to use' technology, they might develop gaps in digital skills when it comes to more complex technology. They then become adults who lack confidence to handle new technology in the workplace and beyond.

### How could this impact children?

Parents are not inclined to positively reinforce anything they fear or do not trust themselves. Parents and adults who work with children need to reflect on their own digital literacy. If they themselves don't think about their own positive and negative interactions, adjusting their use of technology accordingly, they might struggle to pass these skills on to their children.

In fact, **Internet Matters research** shows that parents who feel more confident online are more likely to see the positives of the internet.

### **Engage with the same content**

Engage with the same content that interests your children. Be present and try to understand as much as possible about the digital landscape your child interacts with to support greater understanding.

This could look like joining in with online gaming or using the same social media platforms. It means you get to understand how the apps and platforms work and the pitfalls to avoid. Additionally, you gain insight into the positives within these online spaces.

As parents, we cannot shy away from technology or the digital world. We have to adapt and learn to embrace it. After all, it will only grow and become an even more present part of the next generation's lives.

### **Keep up open communication**

Keep talking to your child about how they use their online spaces and

For example, your child might want to create content for platforms like YouTube or TikTok. After all, it's a fun activity to do with their friends. However, do they understand the implications of posting content online? Do they know the potential harms or how to handle them?

Discussing these interactions not only helps a child think critically about their digital space; it also helps you learn about platforms and your child's knowledge on dealing with issue. An open, positive narrative allows both parties to adapt and remain in control of their digital lives.

### LAW Mock Trial 2024

On Saturday 3 February, Stowe hosted the Regional Heats for the Young Citizens' Independent School Mock Trial Competition. We were joined by pupils from St John's College Oxford International College, Edgbaston High School for Girls, Cardiff Sixth Form College, Princethorpe College and Piper's Corner School.

The Independent School Mock Trial Competition helps young people understand how the law touches every aspect of their lives, gaining an insight into how the legal justice system works. Schools are given access to resources, including specially written criminal cases, to help teams prepare legal arguments. After preparation, teams take part in Regional Heats and go head-to-head with other schools to prosecute and defend the cases.

In the first round of the day, Stowe were the prosecution for a case about the theft of data on a computer. Lily-Anne Moon (Upper Sixth, Nugent) and Alina Rabyk (Upper Sixth, West) took on the role of barristers very well, making some strong statements to the court and also questioning witnesses well. The prosecution witnesses for this case were played by Romayo Seaton (Lower Sixth, Cobham) and Araan Sobhan (Upper Sixth, Bruce), who had learnt their witness statements so well, they were able to answer all questions posed to them on the stand.

The second round involved Stowe acting as the defence team in a case about a protestor causing a public nuisance. Sirmour Bala (Lower Sixth, Grenville) and Isabelle Hunponu-Wusu (Lower Sixth, Stanhope) were the barristers for the case, and put together some strong speeches arguing that the defendant was not guilty. The defence witnesses for this case were played by Xavier Nylaende (Lower Sixth, Bruce) and Andrii Mamakin (Fifth Form, Temple), who effectively played on the emotions of the court to garner sympathy from the jury. This worked in their favour, with the jury deciding that the defendant was not guilty. A great win for the Stowe team!

Round Three saw the defence team in action again, this time trying to defend a case related to theft of digital property. Again, Stowe gave an excellent performance in this round, aided by Harry Langford (Lower Sixth, Chandos), who was the Court Clerk and usher in all three rounds.

After some difficult trials, the pupils were then granted the opportunity to have a Q&A session with the judges, all of whom have worked in a Magistrates Court, and some have even worked in the High Courts. Jos Honour, Christopher Tyrer, Peter Marquard, Sharzad Aziz and Nicholas Easterman all answered the questions well and gave a really great insight into life in the legal profession. It was an excellent opportunity to learn more about the UK legal system and roles involved in this.

The day ended with the Winners of the Regional Heat being announced, the honour being given to Piper's Corner School. Despite not winning the overall competition, Stowe pupils were highly commended for their efforts.

The team from Stowe did an excellent job in preparing for the trial, and also represented the School fantastically on the day itself, not just in terms of the trials, but also in terms of ensuring all visitors were well cared for. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Catering Department and House Staff teams for supporting the event, which would not have been able to go ahead without their help.

The Harry Potter fans knowledge was really put to the test when they were quizzed on statistics


and facts from Potter World! Would you be able to answer when the first Harry Potter book was released or name Ron Weasley's brothers?




# Get Caught Reading - World Book Day Competition

From Monday 29 to Wednesday 31 January, I spent three days in Parliament, as part of the Parliament Teacher Ambassador Programme. 70 teachers from across the UK came together to learn more about the inner workings of the Houses of Commons and Lords, with the aim that they will utilise this knowledge to educate as many young people as possible.

During my time on the course, I had the pleasure of having a tour of the Speaker's House, and meeting with Sir Lindsay Hoyle (Speaker of the House of Commons since 2019) to discover more about his unique role in the House of Commons. He was incredibly enthusiastic about encouraging young people to get involved in the political process, especially as this year is likely to be an election year. I was also granted the opportunity to meet with Baroness McIntosh of Hudnall and the Rt Hon Lord McFall, the Lord Speaker, to find out more about the relationship between the two Houses which make up our Parliament, and the work of the peers.

On Tuesday 30 January, I was given a tour of the House of Lords, including the Monarch's robing room and entrance, and was also able to witness the procession of the Speaker into the Commons and observe Question Time on topics related to the Foreign Office. On the final day of the course, I spent time with Elliott Colburn (MP), who gave a fascinating insight into the work of the Petitions Committee. Having developed my own subject knowledge, I now hope to bring this back to the Politics and PSHE Departments at Stowe, as well as to other schools. This would allow the Stowe to become a Parliament Teacher Ambassador School.

# Myles Henry Award and Gap Award

The winners will have to attend a travel safety course and after completion pupils will have to write a report for one of Stowe's publications and present their travel and volunteering experience to Stoics.

Applicants presented their project and travel plans to an experienced panel of judges who had the opportunity to ask probing questions at the end of the presentation. For the first time, this year, all the volunteering destinations are in Africa. Presentations included the introduction to the volunteering project, the benefits to the Stoics as well as financial budgeting and how the funds will be raised.

This year the judging panel consisted of past winners Alex Dens (Grenville 22) (Gap Award 2022), Martha Blake (Upper Sixth, Cheshire), Annie Flint (Upper Sixth, Queen's), Martha Robertson (Upper Sixth, Stanhope) and Jemima Dare (Upper Sixth, Queen's) (Gap/Myles Henry Award 2023) as well as Ms Shah and Ms Guntner.

Congratulations to this year's winner of the Gap Award, Alice Bryant (Upper Sixth, Queen's) and Sandrine Van Grembergen (Lower Sixth, Queen's) and Amadea Baxter (Lower Sixth, Nugent) for their Myles Henry Award.

# **Healthy Diet, Healthy Body**

Top tips for healthy eating and exercise

On Tuesday 23 January, George Coote (Stowe Head of Strength and Conditioning) presented about diet and exercise. The talk was tailored for 13-18 year olds in an active School setting and George shared valuable insights to enhance the health and wellbeing of busy pupils.

### Eat a rainbow-coloured plate of food:

Incorporating a variety of fruits and vegetables into every meal is important. The different colours represent different nutrients and vitamins, which are essential for a growing body. For instance, reds (like tomatoes and strawberries) are good for the heart, while greens (such as spinach and broccoli) strengthen bones and muscles

### **Avoid Processed Foods:**

Processed foods often contain high levels of sugar, salt and unhealthy fats, which can lead to health issues such as obesity, high blood pressure, and diabetes. Encourage eating whole, unprocessed foods, for example whole grains, lean proteins, and healthy fats found in nuts and seeds.

### **Balanced Meals Are Key:**

Ensure that each meal is well-balanced, containing a good mix of carbohydrates, proteins, and fats. Carbohydrates provide energy, which is particularly important for active children. Proteins are essential for growth and repair, whilst healthy fats support brain development.

### **Stay Hydrated:**

Drinking enough water is crucial, especially for active individuals. It helps to maintain concentration levels and supports overall physical performance. Avoid sugary drinks and opt for water, herbal teas, or diluted fruit juices.

### Regular, Varied Exercise:

Encourage a mix of aerobic (like running, swimming, or cycling), strength-building (such as bodyweight exercises or light resistance training), and flexibility exercises (yoga or stretching). This variety helps prevent boredom and ensures a well-rounded fitness regime.

### **Listen to Your Body:**

Teach children to be mindful of their bodies' signals. Eating when hungry and stopping when full can help maintain a healthy weight Rest and recovery are also vital, especially after exercise or during periods of growth.

### **Plan Ahead:**

For busy school days, planning meals and snacks in advance can ensure that children have access to healthy options. Preparing food at home allows control over ingredients and portions, promoting better food choices.

### **Limit Screen Time:**

Encourage activities that get children moving and limit sedentary behaviours like prolonged screen time. This promotes a more active lifestyle and better sleep patterns.

George's recommendations focus on creating a healthy, sustainable lifestyle for Stoics, recognising the challenges of balancing academic commitments with physical well-being. Adopting these habits early can set the foundation for a lifetime of health and fitness.


Pupils learned about the various career opportunities available in the sector, touching upon innovative
