On Wednesday 26 April, Stowe welcomed 200 Senior Old Stoics (aged 70 and above), for a Centenary SOS Lunch and reunion in honour of this special year. For the first time ever, the lunch was held in the Chapel, which was transformed to a magnificent and fitting lunch venue.

Our guests were joined by the Head and other members of Staff for a drinks reception and three-course lunch. Old Stoic Society Chair, Luke Chauveau (Cobham 87), welcomed everyone on behalf of the Society, before handing over to John Fingleton (Chatham 66). John was pleased to say that four children of the first cohort of 99 boys were present at the lunch, and he also remembered those Old Stoics who have recently passed away.

After lunch, Dr Anthony Wallersteiner addressed the audience, reminding them of what makes Stowe and Stoics unique. He remarked on the outstanding contribution Old Stoics have made to the world and thanked them for their continued support of

the School. Guests were then treated to a musical recital by Stowe musicians and singers, followed by a rousing piece by Jonathan Kingston on the Chapel organ and a rendition of Jerusalem, sung by all. The event finished with a group photograph.

This Old Stoic Society event was only made possible with a tremendous team effort from House Staff, Housekeeping, Security, Maintenance, Stowe Catering, Estates, the Chaplain, the Music School, the General Office Team and the Development Team.



# Economics of Pollution and Sustainability

On Monday 24 April, Dr Rehab Osman, Senior Lecturer and Subject Coordinator for Economics Programmes at Oxford Brookes Business School, delivered an engaging careers talk to Stoics on the topic of Economics of Pollution and Sustainability. The presentation underscored the importance of understanding pollution, sustainability, and the social costs and benefits associated with pollution control measures.

Dr Osman explained how economists assess the social costs of production, focusing on pollution and its impact on sustainable development. She introduced the concepts of Marginal Social Benefit (MSB) and Marginal Social Cost (MSC) of pollution control, demonstrating their significance in determining the optimal level of pollution control. Pupils were encouraged to use provided tables to calculate MSB and MSC at various levels of pollution control, ultimately comparing them to advise policymakers on the most efficient pollution control measures.

The careers talk also explored the economics of electric vehicles (EVs) and their associated social costs and benefits. Dr Osman asked pupils to identify positive and negative externalities in the EV market, such as carbon emissions, congestion, accidents, energy security, and charging infrastructure. This exercise aimed to justify government intervention in the market to ensure all relevant externalities are internalised by consumers and producers.

During the talk, Dr Osman provided guidance to Stoics about some of the economics degrees on offer at Oxford Brookes University. She mentioned three programmes: Economics (128 UCAS points), Economics, Finance and International Business (104 UCAS points), and Economics, Politics and International Relations (104 UCAS points). Oxford Brookes accept the EPQ as part of this. Dr Osman explained that it might be possible for pupils to move between programmes in the first year, depending on their interests. Oxford Brookes is ranked 78th in the QS world rankings for Business and Management and 251st for Economics.

Throughout the presentation, Dr Osman emphasised the relevance of economic theory in addressing real-world issues, such as pollution and sustainability. By engaging pupils in practical exercises and discussions, the talk highlighted the importance of developing critical thinking and problem-solving skills, essential for success in the study of economics at the university level and in the AQA A Level in Economics.

Dr Osman's careers talk provided Stoics with valuable insights into the economics of pollution and sustainability while demonstrating the importance of economic theory in addressing these pressing issues. The session also emphasised the essential skills required by pupils planning to study economics at university and highlighted the relevance of the AQA A Level in Economics to contemporary environmental challenges. # Arts Award Day Musical Theatre Workshop

For our Fourth Form Arts Award Day on Monday 24 April, we were joined by Rob Parker, Musician and Composer, for a Musical Theatre Workshop. We were taught about the art of musicals and created ideas and initial scripts for our own

We began with a discussion about what we thought about musicals and our own experiences with them. We then moved on to watching certain clips which truly highlighted the differences between plays with music, and musicals, and discussed this. I made the suggestion that the music in plays was to be used for effect and to help enhance the play, whereas the music in musicals plays a central role and helps to move the story along rather than just supplying it.

The conversation moved to the different types of musicals, and we came up with ones based on films, books, real life stories or even just written around pre-existing music. Once we had established what a musical was, we then needed to identify how a story can function in a musical and common ways in which they are structured and written. The ultimate goal was to produce our own ideas in a jukebox style, which means they are written using pre-existing songs in mind.

The task took the form of a Musical Idea Competition, for which we worked in groups, choosing several songs which could be used to accompany or progress a story that we wrote, and culminating in a presentation of the musicals and whether the idea would be good

enough for the judges (Mr Parker, Ms Parker, Ms Wheeler and the others in the Arts Award Group) to invest in.

The ideas ended up much darker than expected however the standard of the ideas was incredibly high and Mr Parker stated that they were much better than many of the musicals which make it through nowadays. The musical by Imogen Embley (Queen's) and Mila Dozono (Lyttelton) tells the story of a boy who falls in love with a girl who will never feel the same way, which was named 'Ghost of Love' and was inspired by the works of U2. Seren Powell's (Cheshire) musical is one of love where a member of the LGBTQIA+ community gets killed for being himself, and is based on the music of Youngblood. Ben Barbeli (Grafton), Jason Lu (Walpole) and Noah's (visiting overseas pupil) story is a one-sided love story about an obsessive ex, which ends with acceptance, played out by a song by Tyler the Creator, which most of the musical is accompanied by. As for my own, I decided to go with the Panic! At the Disco album 'A Fever You Can't Sweat Out' and follows the different lives of people throughout a city and has themes of death and cheating which is narrated by an omniscient figure.

When asked what they thought of the day, Mila said "today allowed me to explore art forms I was unfamiliar with" which was really what this day was about. Immy commented that "today made me appreciate the story of an album I love."

# German Fourth Form Exchange

It was a most positive experience that facilitated the lucky few to not only improve their German, but to be able to directly experience the German way of life. There was definitely a culture shock for some when we travelled by means of Lufthansa!

Attending a school that is part of the Round Square Group of Schools, and has a different way of teaching, was definitely very beneficial and helped us acquire a more cosmopolitan worldview for the future. It was interesting to see the lack of uniform, the music concert assemblies and the atmosphere of living in a place with a significantly smaller number of people. It was fascinating to eat within a large hall with the whole school, in allocated groups at a table, where it was very important to start at the same time and finish at the same time. This made meals a much more important event than at Stowe. Eating whilst looking at a huge Crucifix on the wall was also quite a unique experience.

The beautiful Lake Ammersee around which the school is set, was definitely worth seeing.

As the school owns a private boathouse, we were able to go there and gaze

at the water and the not-so-distant Alps. One of the highlights of our trip was when some of us went to bathe in the lake which proved to be much colder than expected - six degrees Celsius!

Our German host families were all very welcoming and organised a lot of events, such as a dinner at the Andechs Monastery, a night out at the bowling alley, and in my case, a trip to the famous Deutsches Museum in Munich. As a school year, we also went to visit the Dachau Concentration Camp. It was most solemn, but necessary for us to look at the past, so that as human beings we can understand what is necessary for a brighter future.

On our last day, we went to Munich where we saw the Rathaus and other famous landmarks, and finished by drinking alcohol-free beer at a traditional Bavarian Beer Hall. We had a most enjoyable trip and when the time came for us to say goodbye, it was not too sad because we knew that our exchange partners, with whom we had grown quite close, would come to Stowe a couple of weeks later. It was a unique experience that I think will stay entrenched in the memories of all who came to Landheim, as it allowed us to discover so many new things, meet interesting people and learn German at the same time.

# German Sixth Form trip to Berlin


At the start of the Easter holidays, the German Sixth Form pupils embarked on a trip to Berlin to experience some of its many historic and cultural gems. The trip started with a visit to the Stasi Museum where an eyewitness talk in German gave the pupils a first-hand insight into life under the oppressive East German regime and the devastating consequences of resisting it. The museum also offered many insights into how the German secret police operated, allowing the pupils to draw parallels to what they are learning as part of the curriculum.

An alternative tour of the German capital gave us a different perspective of the city, diving into the street art near Alexander Platz, and visiting places of post-reunification alternative culture such as Dead Chicken Alley! This bohemian street gallery reflects the desire of a group of young artists called The Dead Chicken Society, to express themselves freely, shortly after the fall of the Berlin Wall. It also houses a museum dedicated to Otto Weidt, who employed mainly blind and deaf Jews in his factory during World War II, saving them from deportation to concentration camps.

Another highlight was a Berliner Unterwelten tour, which took us through underground bunkers and secret passages below the buzzing streets of the city, to discover escape tunnels East Germans have dug under the wall to escape from East to West Berlin. It was fascinating and humbling to hear the courageous stories of the escapees and the brave helpers aiding their attempts to be free of oppression.

We also had the opportunity to experience an outstanding Baroque music concert in true Berlin style - in the Kühlhaus, an old industrial cooling house. The superb all-female ensemble delighted with beautiful music, with the exceptional Soprano, Sara Gouzy.

#### **Impressions from the Stoics**

Between Thursday 23 and Monday 27 March, we had the great opportunity to visit Berlin. We visited many important and famous places, such as the Brandenburg Gate, the East Side Gallery, the Memorial to the Murdered Jews of Europe and the Berlin Underworld. We had already learned about some of these places, but seeing them in person gave us a greater understanding. For myself, and for my peers, one of the most interesting attractions was the Stasi Museum (Stasi was the secret police agency of the GDR, East Germany).

Another thing that fascinated us was how people were escaping from East Berlin, by digging tunnels. We saw replicates of some of the successful tunnels, but also one of the original ones. The Berlin Wall had, and still has, a significant importance for Berlin, as it used to be a border between East and West Berlin. Nowadays, it has become an art gallery, with lots of beautiful and interesting paintings and graffiti on it. Overall, it was an insightful and informative trip.














It was expected to rain, but for the first half of the field exercise the weather proved to have an innate sense of mercy and decided to stay cloudy. We paraded on the North Front, in CCF field uniform, by the King George statue early in the morning before duly arriving at the Bourbon. Once there, we proceeded to be divided into groups within our Platoons.

We participated in various challenging activities that lasted until five o'clock. These were designed to test our team spirit, endurance and ability to deal with simulated real-life situations and onhand problems. There were some failed attempts to pass the Weapon Handling Test for the A2 Cadet General Purpose Rifle, which included safe handling and NSP's (Normal Safety Precautions); passing the test was required for us to have permission to blank fire later in the afternoon. Thankfully, in the end, most of us got through that stage. There were other activities that included orienteering in Stowe Park. For that, we had to locate check points with our phones within a 25-minute timer. For every check point, points were added, but when the timer ran out we had to run back, and every minute over meant deducted points. This was something that not everybody fully understood, resulting in a lot of puffing and red-faced teenagers!

We also demonstrated our abilities to take cover whilst taking part in the blank firing fire-and-manoeuvre section attacks. For my group, that happened amidst a continuous downpour of rain so characteristic to the climate of this country, meaning the grass had become very wet and muddy. We were learning the techniques of 'Charlie' and 'Delta' Fire Team formations whilst under enemy fire, and had to 'stay alive' whilst trying to locate enemy fire.

We also had various other activities which brought the team together such as Command Tasks, Air Rifle shooting and fun laser tag sessions, although the main highlight of the day had to come down to the blank fire shooting. Following a nail-biting victory at Kelso just prior to Christmas, she was prepared for the big end of season Mares' Final at Newbury with OS Harry Bannister (Chatham 12) in the saddle. Despite no owners being able to attend, all the members of the OSRC gathered around their TV screens to watch her lead from start to finish and bring about a memorable and exhilarating victory on ITV Racing for Stowe - making it a Stowe bred, owned, trained, and ridden Grade 2 Winner!

She was retired happy and healthy at the beginning of 2022, having won two races and finished placed on five occasions from thirteen races, winning just shy of £30K in prize money.

In March of this year, Bourbon Beauty gave birth to a beautiful filly by Planteur and we hope this next generation will be racing in the Stowe colours in years to come.

#### **Mild Illusion**

Just occasionally in life, some magic happens to you.

And that is what happened with our first horse in training with our second OS trainer, Jonathan Portman (Chatham 83), thanks to Mild Illusion. Mild Illusion's half-sister had been purchased for 250,000 guineas in 2018 and that was really the only reason Jonny decided to stick his hand up to buy her at the yearling sales for just 1000 guineas. Leased to our first Old Stoic Racing Club syndicate during 2019, we hoped she would do well on the track.

# RAF Section visit to RAF Odiham

On Monday 24 April, Cadets travelled to RAF Odiham, an active RAF station. We arrived there at 10am where we were greeted by Sergeant Brooks who would be our guide for the day. After setting our things down we were guided to 27 Squadron's hangar which contained various models of a Chinook (an Mk5 and Alpha 6). We looked at the Chinooks and were told about the history of them, learning about all the different functions and how they work. During lunch we were lucky enough to witness two Chinooks taking off, which was a wonderful sight to see.

After lunch we split into two groups. One went to the Armoury and was taught about the guns and machinery that are most common, and guns that are still in service. We were able to handle them which was a great way to get a feel for how they work. One of the best guns, in our opinion, was the mini gun which they use in a Chinook as it's electric, and fires around 2,000 bullets a minute.

The second group went to the Survival Hut to learn about all the equipment that you would need to survive in different terrains. We were taught about what happens if we were stranded at sea; we had a go in the inflatable rafts and ate the different rations that we would have to eat to survive. We tried boiled sweets, which on some courses, the RAF have to survive on for four days.

# Stoic Success in the Royal Society of Chemistry's Olympiad Competition

The Chemistry Olympiad is part of an international competition, the first round of which sees A Level pupils sit a written test of their chemical knowledge. This two-hour paper is based on real-world situations and deliberately challenges pupils to think beyond their A Level studies and encourage a way of thinking more commonly found in university courses.

Over 11,800 pupils from more than 800 schools worldwide took part in this year's competition, and questions were asked on a wide range of topics including the chemistry of rocket fuels, vaping and cheese.

During the Lent Term, seven of our Upper Sixth Chemists took part, and all were rewarded with either a bronze or silver certificate. Bronze Awards went to Linda Wang (West), Tham Luanghvisut (Walpole), Yuki Jiang (West) and Alexandra Aswani (Nugent), whilst Paddy Potts (Chandos), Terry Tan (Chandos) and Emily Sutton (Queen's) achieved Silver Awards. Furthermore, Paddy and Terry's score placed them both within the top 13% of all who took part.

# **Behind the Wall**

Private appointments are available to those who feel they would benefit from some support, advice and strategies for managing stress, or just somebody to listen. Last term, the Centre offered over 25 one to one appointments to pupils who were referred for support.

One pupil had the following to say: "I think it's such a great idea that there is somewhere we can go and somebody we can speak to when we are struggling with things. Life at Stowe is very full on, and it can be a lot of coming and going from lessons to activities, and our time is very full, so to have a little bit of space to take a breath and speak to somebody where no one else is around has really helped me with my anxiety and feelings of homesickness. I went to four sessions and was given some practical tools to help - some I used, and some I didn't - but it was good to have options. Thank you for the time and for listening."

As the Summer examinations approach, the Wellbeing Centre will be offering 'Stress Buster Sessions' to help Upper Sixth and Fifth Form pupils who are facing their exams and could use an extra layer of support during this challenging phase of their education.

On Thursday afternoons, the Centre is used for Staff yoga and this is well attended and received, a great way for Staff to get some exercise and de-stress after a long day.

The Wellbeing Centre is just one of the many initiatives at Stowe designed to help the wellbeing of every member of our community. Throughout the coming year we will be working with the Carnegie Centre of Excellence for Mental Health in Schools to gain accreditation for their School Mental Health Award, a recognition of the work everyone is doing to promote mental health initiatives for Staff, pupils and parents.
