
A new magazine has been created to showcase a selection of the many excellent written projects submitted by Third Form Stoics as the culmination of their Vanguard work for the Lent Term 2017. This work was brought together in just a term, with only one 80 minute lesson per week.

The aims of the project were to get pupils to engage in more depth with an academic enquiry of their choosing, and in doing so develop and display their skills around project planning, self-monitoring and reflection, independent academic research, referencing, drafting and redrafting a longer piece of written prose. The pupils designed their own title or question, used a Gantt chart to plan and monitor their progress, offered critique to their peers and were encouraged to reflect on their own work in weekly blogs. The final lesson, when individuals presented their work to their peers, saw Stoics animatedly discussing their research around topics such as social media, graffiti, sports psychology, gun laws, the problem of suffering and illegal deforestation.

It has been fantastic to see so many pupils so engaged and taking such pride in their work and I hope you enjoy this selection!

We had the pleasure of trying 15 different wines, all of varying ages, and Andrew spoke with advice on both the differences in tasting for each year and the history of Chablis wines.

We held the tasting at The Phene in Chelsea, which proved to be a popular venue, with tickets for the event selling out very quickly and over 50 Old Stoics and guests in attendance. Guests enjoyed plentiful amounts of wine and delicious canapés.

Those of you attending Speech Day on Saturday 27 May will be able to see our installation of willow sculptures on the parterre that have been created by Camilla Kingham (mother of Alfie Kingham, Upper Sixth, Walpole). This collection of unique hand woven willow organic forms was created exclusively for Stowe from this season's harvest of Somerset Levels Salix Viminalis. These individual shapes evolved as they were worked, with the fresh willow contributing a continuing fluidity, making it difficult to know when and where to conclude a piece, hence the name, Round and round we go!

Camilla was introduced to willow at an early age; her late mother, Ann Kingham owned a Rare Breeds Farm, where they had regular demonstrations, workshops and a shop selling beautiful articles including chestnut and willow baskets. Seven years ago, Camilla saw some woven willow chickens, which had been made by Julieann Worrall Hood. Subsequently, she took several courses with Julieann learning both willow and wire work.

Camilla loves working outside with nature, and enjoys losing herself in each individual piece as she works. She finds that if one is making something for the first time, the willow can dictate the shape if you allow it, which can make it take on a persona of its own. Willow has a gorgeous scent, which makes it all the more pleasant and evocative to use. The process of producing a willow sculpture is fairly physical and heavy especially if making something large from fresh willow.

Some more recent commissions that Camilla has worked on include: Woodland Folk and Nomads. The making of a collection of spheres for the Artisan Garden entrance and the Artisan's Retreat Area at RHS for Chelsea Flower Show and many of you will remember her last installation at Stowe for Speech Day in 2015.

### Alexander Technique

Last week the Music Department hosted two workshops on the Alexander Technique, led by experienced Alexander teacher Lynn Boreham. The workshops were open to all members of the Stowe community and it was good to see staff and pupils from across the School. Frederick Alexander was an actor who was continually losing his voice. The medical profession were unable to help and eventually Alexander embarked on a lengthy process of self-observation to see if there were any physical tensions which might have an impact on his voice. The techniques he developed are in use world-wide and they centre on releasing muscular tensions resulting in greater physical ease and efficiency. The first workshop was aimed at voice users, both singers and speakers, and the second workshop was aimed at instrumentalists. In both workshops, participants and observers were often startled by the noticeable changes in tone and power that came about by making apparently small adjustments in the body. It is hoped to run more sessions or arrange regular lessons in Alexander Technique. Please contact **Rachel Sherry** if you would be interested.

#### Sam Quek MBE visits Stowe

On Wednesday 24 May 2017 we were honoured to welcome Sam Quek MBE to Stowe to offer two hockey master-classes and speak to our 1st team athletes at the Sports Awards Evening.

Making her International debut in 2008 Sam has made over 125 International appearances for England and Great Britain. Her honours include a silver medal at the Euro Hockey Championships in 2013, Silver at the Commonwealth games in 2014 and captaining England later that year in the Champions Trophy in Argentina.She went on to win a Gold medal with England at the European Championships in 2015 and was named player of the match in the final against reigning World and Olympic Champions, The Netherlands.

In 2016 she helped Great Britain win Gold at the Rio Olympics in a thriller of a match against The Netherlands capturing the hearts of millions as GB won on penalties in one of the most exciting matches in recent times across all sports. Recently awarded an MBE for services to hockey she has inspired and continues to inspire the next generation of young athletes.

During the Sports Awards evening 90 staff and pupils celebrated the year's sporting achievements and trophies were awarded to those who have made an outstanding contribution to their key sport. Special awards, named the "Triple Crown", were awarded for those pupils who have represented the School at three key sports at 1st team level this year. This special honour was awarded to Callum Renshaw, Archie Dixon-Smith and Victoria Beglin.

Sam Quek gave a superb speech about her highs, lows and champagne moments in the lead-up to the Rio Olympics and inspired the pupils to remember that "Tough moments don't last but tough people do." Many thanks to Henry Larkin who brilliantly compered the evening.

### Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors Awards

Restoration of the Blue Room was shortlisted in the Conservation Projects category of the Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors Awards for South East England. Although the nomination was not successful, the competition was extremely strong and just being shortlisted alongside twelve other projects is testament to the quality of SHPT's research and project delivery. Anna McEvoy showed the judging panel around the room and they were very impressed, not just with the quality of restoration in the room itself but also by its relationship to other work completed by SHPT and the way in which SHPT and the School are working to the progressive restoration

of the whole Mansion. The judges' citation recorded: "Stowe's Blue Room was meticulously restored and re-presented in line with its former Victorian appearance. Informed by extensive research including paint analysis, this decorative scheme was chosen as it had the least impact on existing fabric. The flooring, decoration, framed silk damask, fireplace and mirror were faithfully recreated. Works addressed plaster failure, heating and security issues. Purcell's elegant transformation of the room enables its continued use for visitor tours, private functions and as a tuition space for Stowe School."

Abby's Memorial Hockey Festival

On Saturday 13 May over Exeat, Stowe hosted 'Abby's Memorial Hockey Festival' in memory of Old Stoic Abby Webb.

Abby was the star of Buckingham Ladies' Hockey Club and England Under-16 but sadly died of neuroendocrine cancer just before her 25th birthday in December 2015.

GB and England hockey stars including Zoe Shipperley, Sarah Haycroft, Hollie Webb, Susie Gilbert, Georgie Twigg, Jo Hunter, George Pinner and James Fair united with over 400 of Abby's family and friends for this inaugaural event. An 11-a-side memorial match, for anyone who has ever played hockey with Abby including some Rio Olympic gold-winning players, started proceedings. Afterwards, hundreds of spectators enjoyed around 24 mixed teams of seven people competing in a half-pitch tournament.

GB and England men's goalkeepers George Pinner and James Fair hosted a fundraising penalty shuffle (shoot-out), and there were children's activities, refreshments, an auction and a raffle.

The event managed to raise nearly £7,000 for

Of this amazing charity, Abby had said: "It offers whole person support to people with cancer and their close supporters, in many different ways, to meet the needs of the individual. I cannot tell you what an incredible place it is, and the free courses I've been on and people I've met make it truly inspiring. The impact it has on people going through this lifechanging journey is phenomenal. How it helps people take back control of health, wellbeing and their lives is just incredible, particularly when they've been in such a dark place, with no hope and light."
